
Edward S. Deevey, Jr., President 1969-70

Dr. Edward S. Deevey, Jr. (born Albany, N.Y., 3 December 1914; B.A., Yale, 1934; Ph.D. (zoology), Yale, 1938) is Killam Professor of Biology at Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia; President, 1969-70, of the Ecological Society of America; and since 1968 a member of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada and of the Canadian Committee for the International Biological Programme. His earlier career included academic posts at the Rice Institute (1939-43) and at Yale University (1946-68); research experience at Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution (1943-46), the Geological Survey of Denmark (1953-54), and University of Canterbury, Christchurch, New Zealand (1964-65); and a tour as Section Head, Environmental and Systematic Biology, National Science Foundation. He is a Fellow of the Geological Society of America and of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and a charter member (since 1938) of the American Society of Limnology and Oceanography and a member of its Public Affairs Committee.
